Casework: Individuals and Families

"Get out there...No one else is going to do it for you!" by Amfana

My name is Khanyelihle Mazanga but many people call me Amfana. I've been on a life-changing journey with my Life Coach from Mpower. It all started when my Mom and I were worried about the fact that I was sitting at home, not going to school and not working. I tried looking for jobs and sometimes I would get temporary jobs but that wasn't enough. I wanted to study further. I wanted to be able to provide for my mother who has been there all my life and who sacrificed a lot for me. After passing my Matric my Mom couldn't afford to pay for my tertiary fees. I wanted to study IT but I also had other dreams. I wanted to do work that would serve the community, like being a Police Man, A Soldier, Fire-fighter or a Paramedic. During our sessions with my Life Coach we discussed different options and she gave me homework to go and research the things I wanted to do. Doing this wasn't always easy. Sometimes this research led to more disappointment. At one point I found a Fire-fighter school but it was too expensive and there was no way my Mom would be able to pay for it. But I didn't give up. I went to speak to my previous teacher about opportunities to volunteer while I was looking for more long-term career opportunities. I ended up sharing my dream of becoming a Fire-fighter with him and he told me about a Fire-fighter school in Umhlathuze Municipality that was far cheaper. Even though this opportunity was cheaper my Mom still had to come up with money to pay for it plus pay for my accommodation and food. My Mom doesn't have a high paying job. She went from one bank to another asking for a loan.

All the banks she went to turned her down. Then she asked her employers at Thumbtribe and they agreed to lend her the money for me to attend Fire-fighter school in Umhlathuze. I was happy and nervous at the same time. I knew I had to study very hard and as soon as I got there I made sure I mixed with other young people who had the same goal and we started a study group. We had to do 2 levels and my hard work paid off. I passed both levels with flying colours. My journey hasn't ended yet as I am still looking for a job and in the mean time I am volunteering my skills to get experience. I would like to thank my Mom who never gave up on me. I know she sacrificed a lot for me to be where I am. I would also like to thank my Mom's employers, Thumbtribe, who trusted my Mom with a loan for my training. They also connected me with Mpower and that is how I got to have a Life Coach. I wish more young people could have the opportunity to have a Life Coach; someone to sit down and talk to about their dreams and plan towards their goals because I know how this has helped me.

A few weeks ago I had an opportunity to share my story in Hambanathi during a Behaviour Change Workshop that was hosted by Mpower. My message to the young people there was:

"Work hard, research what you want to do, and most of all don't waste opportunities that come your way. Get out there and find something to do until you reach your goal. No one else is going to do it for you."

I was greatly humbled by this experience of talking to them. This was my way of paying it forward.

Community Projects

Children's Afterschool Club.

This Children's afternoon Club continues to be a place where 80 children come together every Monday to have fun while learning. Our highlight this term has been the amazing help we received from the Methodist Church's Women's Auxiliary (WA) members. The WA chose Mpower as their project this year so they have been supporting us in different ways. Some of the young people received beanies and jerseys in the colder months. We have also received a steady supply of sandwich fillers and craft materials for the educational activities we do with the children. Support like this encourages us to do even more because we see the difference that some of these simple items make in these young people's lives. So a very sincere thank you to the Methodist Church's WA!

We also had a closing party that was supported by several individuals and companies. The young people had great fun and it is always very humbling to witness their gratitude and happy faces. They then surprised us by asking if they could perform a Zulu dance and some songs for us. It was wonderful to witness the growth in confidence of these young people. We thank our friends of Mpower for the support. We greatly appreciate your contributions to the spirit of joy to be found in our Children's Club this year.



Teenagers empowerment groups - Etete and Nkobongo

This term we finished the Hero Book journey, through which each young person in our groups had the opportunity to be the author and illustrator of their own story about their goals, the obstacles standing in their way and their special knowledges and skills for overcoming them. When the Hero Books were completed we held a party in celebration and our young heroes had an opportunity to share parts of their Hero Book if they wanted to. Some invited people who had supported them in some way in their lives to hear their stories too.

After hearing the stories, listeners were asked to affirm the story tellers by sharing how the stories had touched them. In one of the groups I facilitated I noticed that after one of the young girls shared her story everyone in the group had tears in their eyes. At first I thought it was because her story related some painful experiences, but when the listeners shared how her story had touched them I realised that they were moved because they were so inspired by her strength and resilience and her determination to move forward with her life and make something beautiful out of it. I was especially moved by the response that other young people gave her and how they encouraged her to go on.

Some of the Hero Book authors have decided to publish their stories so that others can read them, learn from them and be inspired to work towards overcoming problems in their own lives.

Siyakudumisa Group reported by Bongiwe Mthembu

(This group is sponsored by St Thomas Church, Musgrave)

This is a group of girls that meet every Friday afternoon. This year the girls received blankets from Adapt IT, beanies from the Methodist Church WA and new school uniforms from St Thomas Church. These girls do not only struggle academically but they also face difficulties in their personal lives. Therefore witnessing these young girls' excitement at receiving something to make their lives a little better was a very happy moment for me too! The blankets and beanies came at the right time when it was cold and they kept these young girls warm. The new uniforms helped to bring back a sense of pride in their appearance at school and a greater feeling of self confidence. Thank you to all who sponsored these wonderful gifts.

To the girls' delight the Siyakudumisa group were treated to KFC and party packs at their closing party. They also each received a toiletry hamper as a gift to take home. Thank you to St Thomas Church and a anonymous donor for making these gifts that were so appreciated.
